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





- What is Treatment? An application of planned procedures to identify and change patterns of behavior that are maladaptive, destructive, or health injuring; or to restore appropriate levels of physical, psychosocial or social functioning" (Rinaldi, Steindler, Wilford, & Goodwin, 1988) Token from the Substance Abuse Treatment and the Stages of Change.

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Principles of Harm Reduction

(Harm Reduction Coalition)

- Accepts, for better and or worse, that licit and illicit drug use is part of our world and chooses to work to minimize its harmful effects rather than simply ignore or condemn them.
- Understands drug use as a complex, multi-faceted phenomenon that encompasses a continuum of behaviors from severe abuse to total abstinence and acknowledges that some ways of using drugs are clearly safer than others.
- Establishes quality of individual and community life and well-beingnot necessarily cessation of all drug use—as the criteria for successful interventions and policies.

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Principles of Harm Reduction

(Harm Reduction Coalition)

- oCalls for the non-judgmental, non-coercive provision of services and resources to people who use drugs and the communities in which they live in order to assist them in reducing attendant harm.
- Ensures that drug users and those with a history of drug use routinely have a real voice in the creation of programs and policies designed to serve them.
- OAffirms drugs users themselves as the primary agents of reducing the harms of their drug use and seeks to empower users to share information and support each other in strategies which meet their actual conditions of use.
